B52S HIT SUPPLY ROADS

SAIGON: U.S. B52S struck for the fifth consecutive day in the jungle mountains southwest of Hue where the communists are trying to build wide supply roads.

The Communists reportedly began the project after U.S. Marines choked off most infiltration routes through the Demilitarized Zone.

The biggest military action of the day came in the Mekong Delta where Vietnamese troops launched an air and land assault against a Viet Cong stronghold. Government spokesmen said initial contact was light.

American jets were held to 78 missions over North Viet Nam Tuesday. U.S. planes killed at least 29 Communists and destroyed 140 fortifications in raids in South Viet Nam.

MUSICIAN DEFECTS

NEW YORK: A violin composer considered Communist China's foremost musician has defected to the United States with his family. The musician Ma Szu Tsung apparently fled to escape the current Red Guard purge of intellectuals. He with his wife and two children presently are living in New York with his brother who is a U.S. citizen. Ma's identity was disclosed by the State Department and confirmed by his brother Ma Si Hon also a concert violinist.

Prof. Chou Wen Chung of the Columbia University Music Department said Ma has been regarded as the most prominent musician in China since the 1930s.

SAIGON: The Government announced that Viet Cong terrorists killed 56 persons last week and wounded another 151.

NEW YORK: Adam Clayton Powell was reelected to the seat barred him last Monday by the House of Representatives. Powell got 87 percent of the votes.

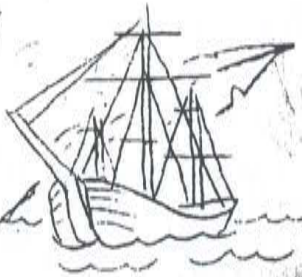
WASHINGTON: Speaker John Mc Cormack called a meeting of House Leaders to discuss the reelection of Adam Clayton Powell. Mc Cormack indicated he favored the seating of Powell.

PARIS, FRANCE: France announced it will formally protest to Washington the burning of a French flag in Boston in retaliation for the burning of an American flag in Paris during Vice President Humphreys visit.

LOUISVILLE, KY.: Negro leaders offered to send all outsiders out of Louisville for a 10 day cooling off period if the city promised to adopt an open housing ordinance during that time. The Board of Aldermen rejected a proposed open housing ordinance Tuesday, setting off demonstrations in the downtown area.

PUNTA DEL ESTE: The summit meeting of American Presidents were under way Wednesday. The accent seemed to be on low key diplomacy.

BASKETBALL

PHILADELPHIA: The Philadelphia 76ers have ended the long reign of the Boston Celtics as the National Basketball Association champs. The 76ers won the Eastern Division with a 140-116 victory over the Celtics.

This marks the first time that the Celtics have failed to reach the finals of the N.B.A. playoffs since Bill Russell joined the ball club ten years ago.

In this span of time the Celtics won eight out of nine World Championships. The only time the Celtics lost it was to the St. Louis Hawks who were led by Bob Pettit and Cliff Hagen.

The Celtics have been considered by some sports fans as the best team ever assembled in the history of sports.

NEWS Briefs

BREST, FRANCE: French officials said the oil from the sinking American Tanker "Torrey Canyon" washed ashore on dozen of Brittany beaches Tuesday created a terrific problem. And were at a loss on how to clean up the mess.

WASHINGTON: Defense Secretary McNamara said the nations security could be harmed if Congress fails to provide the 596 million dollars he requested for overseas military aid.

MOSCOW: Russians received promise of more consumer goods at the opening session of the Supreme Soviet of the Russian Federation which is the Legislature of the largest Soviet State.

NEW YORK: The F.B.I. announced that a shipment of 420 thousand dollars in cash and bank notes from the Indochina bank in Laos disappeared from the strong room at Kennedy International Airport.

LONDON: A British airline announced it has ordered six Russian helicopters in the first British purchase of Soviet built aircraft.

BRUSSELS: The common market countries agreed on a world price for grain which they will present to the Kennedy round table talks with the United States.

NEW YORK: Directors of the NAACP said Martin Luther Kings linking of civil rights and Viet Nam peace movements was a mistake. They voted to keep the two movements separate.

WASHINGTON: The Supreme Court ruled that Procter and Gamble Co. illegally acquired Clorox Chemical Company. The ruling was a new appreciation of anti-trust laws to companies in different industries.

ATHENS: Anti-Government and Anti-Monarch demonstration hit the heart of Athens Wednesday. Police sources said 31 police men and 30 demonstrators were injured.

BOSTON: A United States Court of Appeals Judge ruled an amendment of the Selective Service Act prohibiting mutilation or destruction of the Draft Card was unconstitutional. He upheld the conviction of David O'Brien because O'Brien failed to carry his card with him at all times. O'Brien burned his Draft Card.

BEIRUT, LEB.: A new border battle erupted between Syria and Israel after Israel sent troops into Syrian Territory according to a Syrian military spokesman.

SAN QUENTIN, CALIF.: Convicted slayer of policeman Aaron Mitchell died Wednesday in San Quentin prison's gas chamber. The execution was the first in California in more than 4 years.

MOSCOW: Spaceman Yuri Gagarin told a Kremlin rally, soviet spacemen are preparing for flights to the Moon and the planets. He gave no timetable for a manned flight.

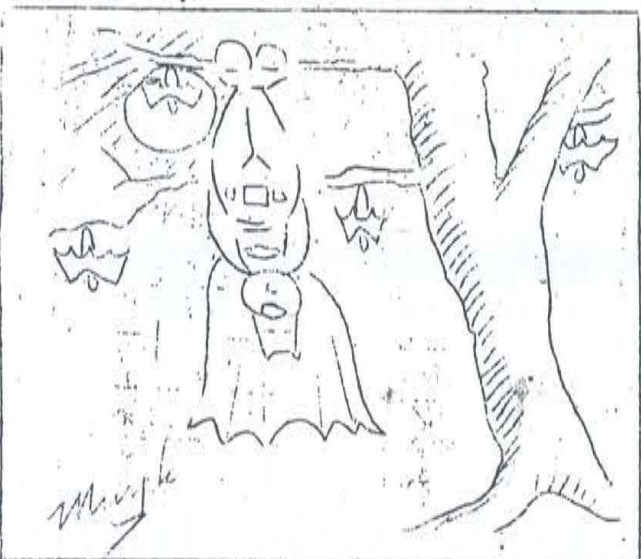
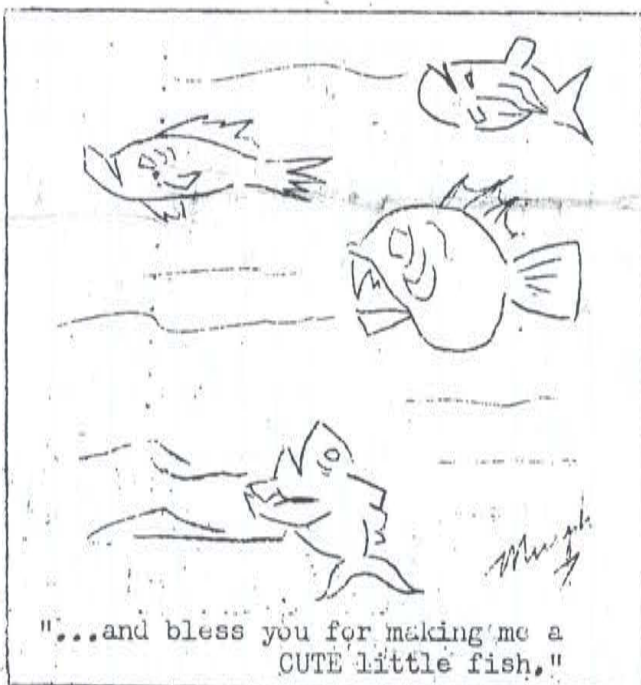
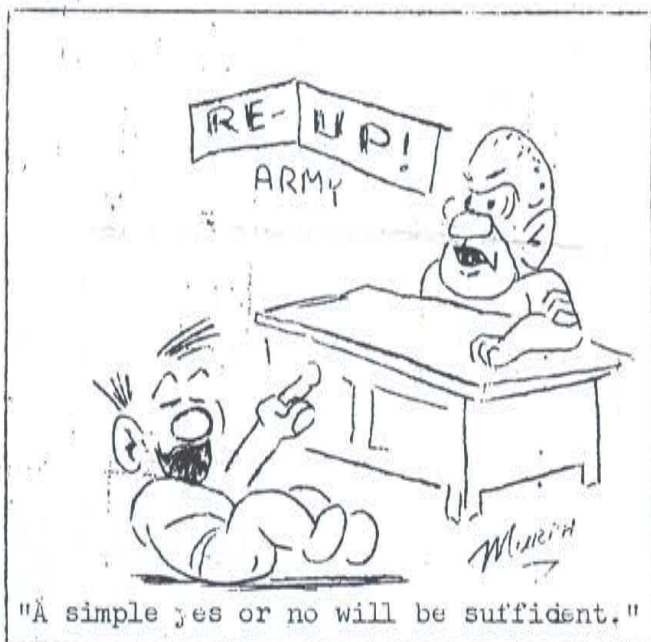
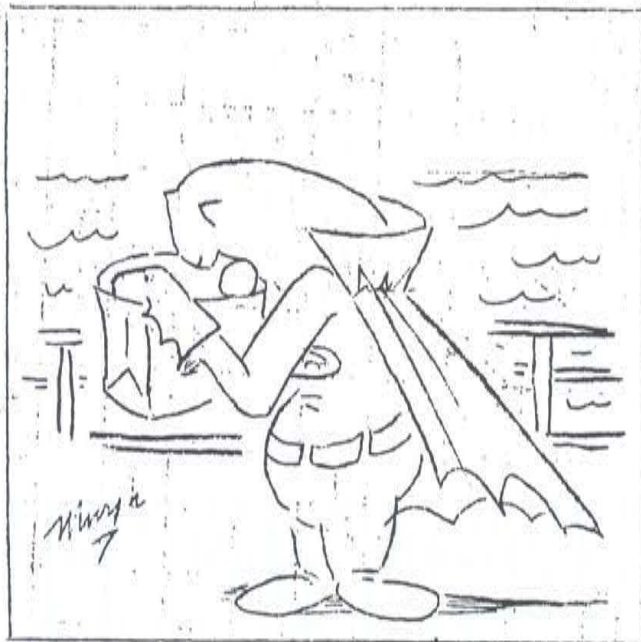
