US CONFIRMS 13 PLANES DOWNED IN WAR LAST WEEK

SAIGON—United States Spokesmen announced Thursday that Communists shot down four United States planes during the third day of attacks on the Hanoi Haiphong area. It was the heaviest single day loss this year over North Vietnam and brought to 13 the number of US aircraft downed in the past week. The Americans have downed two Migs during the week. In South Vietnam a United States Air Force gunship crashed during a mission, killing the seven man crew. American officials also reported 148 United States troops were killed and 1,031 wounded in action last week. The Communist losses last week were set at 1,081 killed.

SENATE ETHICS COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS DODDS CENSURE

WASHINGTON—The Senate Ethics Committee unanimously recommended that Democratic Sen. Thomas Dodd of Connecticut be censured for turning campaign contributions to his own use. Chairman John Stennis filed the censure resolution along with the committee's report on its 14 months investigation of the Senator. The resolution said Dodd was to be censured for conduct which detracts from the public trust of a Senator and tends to bring the Senate into dishonor. Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield said Dodd would be allowed reasonable time to prepare himself on this matter. It was the first time the Senate had been asked to censure one of its members since the late Sen. Joseph McCarthy was punished in 1954.

UTRECHT, THE NETHERLANDS—Dutch Crown Princess Beatrix Thursday gave birth to a son. He was the first boy born into the House of Orange in 116 years.

CAPE KENNEDY—The U.S. Space Agency admitted that the first unmanned flights of its Saturn 5 Moon rocket and the Apollo Moon landing ship have been delayed about three months.

ATHENS—Greece's new military rulers said they acted without King Constantine's knowledge when they seized power in his name last Friday.

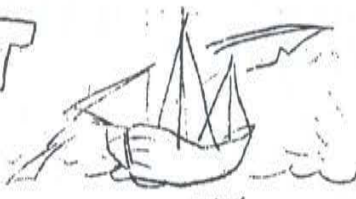
PASADENA, CALIF.—Surveyor 3 used its robot television camera to scan the lunar terrain and photograph topsoil on one of its foot pads.


